President, Defense & Government Services - US Agility



MG Dan Mongeon, US Army (Ret.), is President of Agility's Defense & Government Services, U.S. Dan joined the former Agility Company– PWC Logistics Services, Inc. as the Vice President, Defense and Government Services in January 2006. By July 2006 he was named the President of PWC Logistics Services, Inc., Defense and Government Services – US, a position in which he had overall responsibility for the business development and the operations and strategy functions relating to the defense sector.

Prior to joining the company, Dan served in the U.S. Army for 34 years, most recently as the Director of Operations, J-3, of the Defense Logistics Agency (DLA) in Fort Belvoir, Virginia. With a focus on military readiness, this office provides policy oversight and supply chain management for acquisition, supply, distribution, and property disposal. Dan headed a staff of over 300 civilian and military personnel responsible for providing worldwide logistics solutions to the Military Services as well as to foreign military customers and other federal agencies. This worldwide mission was performed by approximately 23,000 civilian and military personnel with an annual operating budget of over \$31 billion.

Other relevant assignments have included serving as the Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics, G-4, United States Army Forces Command at Fort McPherson, Georgia. He also served as the commander of the Defense Supply center in Philadelphia (DSCP). DSCP is a field activity of DLA. In addition, he served on the Joint Staff in the Pentagon and at NATO Military Headquarters in Mons, Belgium.

Dan received his commission in 1971 as a distinguished military graduate from the University of Arizona where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Public Administration. He received a Masters Degree in Logistics Management from the University of Arkansas. His military schooling includes the Quartermaster Basic and Advanced Courses, U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, and the U.S. Army War College.
